All you have to do is go to <u>http://aspca.org/</u> Request the sticker and they'll mail it to you. While you're there, look around the site. There's lots of great information!



What did he say?/

When we were breeding cockatiels, my husband and I had a few tame pairs we kept in our home. All the males had large vocabularies and learned from one another. We adopted a beautiful cinnamon male named "Jojo" who repeated "Hi Jojo" constantly. I wanted to teach the other males to say their names too. Our most talented talker, Little Feather, was my first student. I repeated "Hi Little Feather" to him as often as I could and was sure he'd pick it up quickly. He did learn, but not what I wanted him to. Whenever Jojo would say "Hi Jojo," Little Feather would come back with "Hi Jo-Feather."



BLOOD FEATHERS

A blood feather is a new, normal feather growing in a bird's skin. Every feather lost in a molt is replaced by a blood feather. Blood feathers contain both an artery and a vein with a circulating blood supply running through the quill. A blood feather has a distinct, dark bluish/purple quill that's shaped like a thick tube. Mature feathers have a thin, opaque quill after the blood recedes.



Broken blood feather

When a blood feather is broken, a bird can bleed profusely and die. Feathers can be broken by rough handling, or bumping or flying into something. The broken feather needs to be pulled from the skin to stop the bleeding as quickly as possible. If you are afraid to pull the feather take the bird to the vet right away. The ONLY way to stop the bleeding permanently is to pull out the feather.

Dr. Margret Wissman in an article for the Humane Society, recommends having two people to remove the feather if possible. She also recommends using hemostats or needle nose pliers. She warns against the use of tweezers.

To remove the feather, extend and support the wing. Blood feathers are painful, so it is best to have someone help you restrain the bird. Grasp the feather at the base of the quill and give it a firm, smooth pull in the direction of the feather growth.

After the feather is removed, apply styptic like Kwik Stop. You can also use

cornstarch or flour, but Kwik Stop contains Benzocaine which will help alleviate pain. Apply direct pressure with gauze for one minute to allow a clot to form.

The complete feather shaft has to be removed to stop bleeding. Before pulling the feather, find the exact spot where the feather goes into the skin. You will feel a bumpy spot under the skin. This is where the follicle ends. To ensure the entire feather shaft is removed, apply pressure by pinching the wing above the bumpy spot. The finger you pinch with should move forward in a sliding motion at the same time you pull the feather. When you remove the feather, you should see a round bulb at the end.

If you find that your bird has broken a blood feather but the bleeding has stopped, it is still advisable to remove it.

FIRST AID KIT FOR BIRDS

*Towels- for wrapping/securing the bird

*Scissors

*Quik Stop and/or Styptic Pencil- to stop bleeding

*Hemostats-for removing blood feathers

*Needle nose pliers-for pulling blood feathers or unbending chains or quick links

*Wire cutters

*Gauze pads

*Cotton Balls

*Q Tips

*Vet Wrap- (cut into strips and rolled) for wrapping wings or binding gauze to wounds

*Micropore Tape- paper surgical tape

*Pen Light or small flashlight

*Magnifying glass

*Sterile water- for flushing wounds

*Pedialyte-for rehydrating a dehydrated bird. Can be mixed with food. Discard open container after 24 hours.

*Handfeeding formula and jar baby food (veggies)-use these to spoon feed a bird too sick to eat on its own.

*Feeding syringes or spoons

*Betadyne-disinfectant. Avoid use of hydrogen peroxide which is caustic to skin

*Aloe Vera- for very minor burns

NIGHT TERRORS in Cockatiels

Night terror is a term used to describe a behavior most commonly seen in cockatiels. I've owned cockatiels for over 20 years, and have seen it often.

Cockatiels are small birds, and in the wild their first defense against attack is escape. When they feel threatened, they will immediately take flight. This poses a problem in the cage. During the night, when the bird sees or hears something frightening, they will try to fly away. The cockatiel then realizes he can't escape, so he will shriek and thrash around the cage.

So how do you prevent it? I don't know that it can be prevented completely, but there are things you can do to lower the chances. First of all, use a nightlight. This will provide enough light so the bird can see and not be so frightened. Cover the cage, but not completely. Leave one side partially open. This should be the side that faces the nightlight. Take care that the open side doesn't face a draft.

If your cockatiel experiences a night terror, the first thing to do is turn on the light in the room. This will help the bird to see everything is okay. Raise the cover and speak calmly to the bird. If he's tame, see if you can take him out and pet him or scratch his head. This will usually help a lot.

The first few times your bird has night terrors, it may be difficult to calm him. The episode may involve violent thrashing which results in injury to the bird, such as a broken blood feather. Observe the bird for a while after the episode to make sure he isn't injured.

5. United Airlines – Non-Discriminating United Airlines loves animals of all kinds. They accept small cats, dogs and birds in the cabin; rabbits, hamsters and guinea pigs as checked baggage and other animals including parrots, cockatiels and ferrets, in United Cargo. (Shipping by cargo is for items, like some pets, that you cannot check as baggage. Your pet may or may not be on the aircraft with you). If you have a shortnosed dog, check your date of flight, as some breeds and mixes are not allowed in cargo or as checked baggage from June 1 through September 30 of each year. 4. <u>American Airlines</u> – Zoo Trusted American Airlines' animal-trained staff has assisted in transporting animals from popular zoos in cargo. While they only allow a limited number of pets in the cabin, they ask pet parents to make special notes for their animal companions flying in cargo and promise to abide by all requests.

3. <u>Airtran</u> – Budget-Friendly Airtran will not let you break the bank to fly with your pet beside you (well technically, under your seat). It is currently the least expensive airline to fly with your small pet; just \$69 each way.

2. JetBlue Airways – Full-Service Pet Love JetBlue really embraced pet-toting travelers when it launched JetPaws last summer. For no additional cost, JetBlue provides a pet carrier bag tag, two TrueBlue points each way, a welcome e-mail and a free pet travel guide. However, like other airlines, JetBlue has hiked its in-cabin pet charge; one-way fees range from \$75 to 100.

1. Continental – Safety-First

Continental is proud of its PetSafe program, which has a 24-hour Live Animal Desk (1-800-575-3335), tracking the pets from origin to destination. It is pricier than other programs, but the cargo area is climatecontrolled, allows roomy carriers and has a designated cargo staff. Travelers using PetSafe can even earn miles. The airline also allows small cats, dogs, pet rabbits and household birds to be carried in the cabin on most domestic flights for \$125 each way.

Next year's list may have a new addition: <u>Pet Airways</u> looks like it might top even these offerings in animal air travel.

BE PREPARED!

Here are a few tips to help you prepare in case of an emergency-

*Photos- Have current, color photos of all your pets

*Have adequate transporting (cages, kennels, etc) housing for all your pets.

*Keep veterinarian information, medication, info, medical records for each pet.

*Keep a small supply of clean up materials such as newspaper, paper towels and trash bags.

*Buddy system- develop a system with a friend or neighbor so someone can get to your pets if you are not able to get home.

*Get an ASPCA sticker for your door to alert rescue personnel that there are pets inside.

*Practice your plan- load the carrier in your car along with your supplies. You'll find any logistical problems before disaster hits.

*Know where you'll go- have a destination in mind. Most shelters WILL NOT take your pets!

*Plan your route-know which way you'll go to get out of town.

*Food and water- make sure you have at least three days food and water for your pets

*ID-make sure all your pets have collars and ID on. For birds, copy the leg band number AND have a color photo. Mark carriers with your name, address, and phone number

*First Aid- have a first aid kit for your pets

*You can store many of your emergency supplies in the cage or carrier you'll be putting your pet in. If you don't use it on a regular basis, then you'll know where everything is when you need it.

Most importantly:

DON'T LEAVE THEM BEHIND!!!!!

EMERGENCY

(Reprint from Charlie's Birdhouse) My awakening to the possibility of a major catastrophe came several years ago when an out-of-control range fire started moving toward my home. I had over 125 birds at that time. What was I supposed to do? Most of them had been neglected or abused in some way and could not be handled. No sense in even thinking that the command "Step Up" would solve my problem. I needed an evacuation plan and I needed a first aid kit. I had neither.

In a bag, hanging near my first aid kit, I now have a heat lamp and clamp, a heating pad, both the electrical and microwaveable varieties, including some "blue ice" hot and cold packs. Several cotton diapers, paper towels, and a thermometer are packed in a plastic reptile aquarium.

Ideally, I would like to have a standard pet carrier available for each bird, but financially, that is out of the question. I have found that pillowcases, with shoelaces used as drawstrings through the hem of the case, work in a pinch. I realize that it wouldn't take long for a Grey Parrot or any other large bird to chew through the pillowcase, but it does provide a means of carrying them until I can get them settled into a larger box or container, once in a safer area.

Make sure you store your mobile containers in a convenient place; however, it isn't wise to have them so close to your bird that a potential thief can use your own emergency container to remove your bird from your home.

If you must lock your cages, have your locks all keyed to one key. Make sure that the key is readily available near the cage. You are not going to have time to look around for keys and carrying containers...keep things accessible.

Have you changed your perches? If you do not want your birds' feet to look like these, it might be time for a change! Perches should be natural in their texture and varied in thickness. The variations cause the bird to use its foot muscles to hang-on and lack of stimulation in the area will cause your bird to lose the dexterity in the feet. Using a dowel stick or smooth PVC pipe is a real no-no.

This greater sulfur crested cockatoo and its mate both suffer from breeder neglect. Diet, ample

cage space and complex elements in its environment including toys, swings and perches could have improved these birds quality of life dramatically.
